3.0	Presentation from Caroline Corrigan – Road Safety Plan
	C Corrigan made a presentation on the Road Safety Plan
	Following the presentation, the Members raised the following:
	<ul> <li>It was also noted that the number of fatalities from outside the county is quite high</li> <li>Have not mentioned the quality of roads we drive on. The plan should include the safety of the roads with regards to sightlines – grass verges that are overgrown etc.</li> <li>Dangerous behaviours contributing to fatalities, alarming that non wearing of seatbelt is top of the list.</li> <li>Speeding is one of the most common issues that arises with constituents when discussing the roads.</li> <li>Ramps, chicanes etc should be considered, to assist the work of the AGS in tackling the issue of speed</li> <li>Fatalities – Motorcyclists, the percentage is higher in Meath than the national average, are more people commuting on this mode of transport and should there be greater awareness?</li> <li>4 Stop junctions – would this be something the Department would look at, for particular locations</li> </ul>
	It was noted that the occurrence of people driving while under the influence of drugs is increasing





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#### Council officials responded as follows

- The idea of this presentation is to show high level statistical information. The preparation of the new plan is a policy making process.
- The percentage of accidents caused by an engineering issue is very low
- As a Roads Authority, we are proactive in the serving of notices on landowners in relation to hedge-cutting and verge cutting, where required. Contractors are also engaged to maintain certain junctions where visibility is an issue.
- Landowners and other stakeholders must take responsibility when it come to the maintenance of their properties/verges etc.
- There will be visibility difficulties at certain locations and every road user has a responsibility to drive at the appropriate speed and with due care.
- Length of journeys that commuters are taking can have an impact on the accident figures, and these are increasing significantly
- Meath County Council highlights accident locations to the DoT and the TII on an annual basis and receives funding for certain safety schemes.
- 4 way stop and junctions this is only implemented if other measures are not working. It might be considered particularly if there are buildings in the way
- There is currently not much data on the use of drugs when driving. There is no limit for this.
- Need to look at suitability of traffic on certain classifications of roads, HGVs using roads that may not be suitable.
- Motorbike usage may increase as the fuel prices go up. This will have to be taken into consideration
- The Plan is a synopsis of the data that is being captured both nationally and locally
- This Plan is in the development stage, there is a workshop being held in July to progress it further. The aim is to finalise the plan in Quarter 3 of this year
- Part of the development of the plan includes the evaluation of the previous plan and the inclusion of the findings in the new plan.

### 4.0 Road Works Programme 2022 – Procurement & Progress

M Devaney made a presentation on the Road Works Programme 2022 – Procurement & Progress

Following the presentation, the members noted the following:

- Presentation was very interesting and informative
- Acknowledged that there is a lot of work being carried out on the Road Works Programme.
- Programme is based on the roads survey should funding not all be spent on the red roads?
- Acknowledged there was a shortfall in funding of €1.4m which was funded from our own resources
- Asphalt suppliers travelling long distances, should we not consider local suppliers, for environmental reasons
- Can recycled materials be considered?





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	<ul> <li>Council officials confirmed the following:</li> <li>Wanted to take this opportunity to highlight the complexities of the tender process for the RWP</li> <li>Future challenges – Green procurement</li> <li>RAP reclaimed asphalt – Trial done on R147 Dowdstown a few weeks ago, testing is ongoing but the results to date are good.</li> <li>Along with recycling pavement, other materials are being looked at and tests are on going. New machinery is also being developed to work with different materials.</li> <li>The use of gravè emulsion has been used in certain trials in Dublin &amp; Galway on cycle lanes but the results have not been positive.</li> <li>Expenditure on the programme has to be spread across the geographical areas. MCC was in a position to make up the shortfall in the programme funding this year, but this does not mean that the same would happen in the future</li> <li>Under procurement rules, the council must consider contractors and suppliers from all over the country.</li> </ul>
