5.1 Planning

5.1.1 To receive a presentation and a report on the progress achieved in securing the objectives of the Meath County Development Plan 2013-2019 (as varied) in accordance with the requirements of Section 15 (2) of the Planning and Development Acts 2000-2014. (deferred from April meeting)

Bernard Greene, Senior Executive Planner, made the presentation which included information on the following:

It was noted that the presentation was a progess report on the County Development Plan and that the overall vision and strategy remain appropriate.

The position of both Meath County Council and the NRA regarding the requirement for an N2 bypass for Slane Village was noted.

It was noted that once the Roads Bill, 2014, is enacted, the NRA and Meath County Council would jointly request a 'pre-planning' meeting with An Bord Pleanála to explore the full nature and extent of requirements for inclusion in a proposed new Planning Application.

The motion was proposed by **Councillor Wayne Harding** and seconded by **Councillor Stephen McKee.**

Following a lengthy debate, the motion was unanimously adopted.

An extension of time (30 minutes) was agreed on the proposal of **Councillor Darren O'Rourke** and seconded by **Councillor Wayne Harding**.

6.1 Report from the Corporate Policy Group

It was agreed to forward the correspondence to the County Co-ordinator for consideration.
- A request from the Ashbourne Municipal District Councillors to recognise the
 achievements of the Irish Ladies Rugby Team was considered. It was agreed
 that it would be appropriate to organise an event in the Ashbourne Civic
 Offices.
- The list of conferences relevant to the business of the Council was approved.

8 Notice of Question

8.1 Submitted by Councillor Francis Deane

"In relation to trespassing on vacant private and/or local authority property, what bylaws are in place and enforceable to prosecute trespassers?"





Response:

The relevant legislation in relation to trespass on private or public property is covered by sections 11 (generally loitering) and 13 (generally trespass with intent.) of the Criminal Justice (Public Order) Act 1994. The Sections read as follows:

- 11.—(1) It shall be an offence for a person—
- (a) to enter any building or the curtilage of any building or any part of such building or curtilage as a trespasser, or
- (b) to be within the vicinity of any such building or curtilage or part of such building or curtilage for the purpose of trespassing thereon,

in circumstances giving rise to the reasonable inference that such entry or presence was with intent to commit an offence or with intent to unlawfully interfere with any property situate therein.

(2) A person who is guilty of an offence under this section shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £1,000 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 6 months or to both.

Trespass on building, etc.

13.—(1) It shall be an offence for a person, without reasonable excuse, to trespass on any building or the curtilage thereof in such a manner as causes or is likely to cause fear in another person.

The enforcement of both Sections is a matter for An Garda Síochána.

8.2 Submitted by Councillor Sean Drew

"Can the Manager please outline what steps have been taken by Meath County Council to give effect to the following resolution unanimously adopted by the members of the Council at the November 2014 meeting?

That this Council resolves to commence the process of varying the County Development Plan by adding the following policies to Section 8 "Energy and Communications.





- (1) To support generation of Wind Power in Meath by commercial and residential users, where a majority of the electricity produced is used directly by the business generator or residential generator (otherwise known as auto-producer production or producer consumption) subject to sustainable planning and development.
- (2) To allow wind power generation for the National Grid or for export from Ireland, only on sites with average annual wind speeds greater than 9 metres per second, (measured at 100 metres above ground level,) in the interests of securing National and EU policy objectives, of minimising the cost of wind energy, maximising efficiency of generation, and in the interests of sustainable planning and development."

Response:

A resolution passed at the November 2014 meeting of the full Council called on the Council to vary the Meath County Development Plan 2013-2019 insofar as it relates to wind energy. Councillors were advised that Section 13 of the Planning and Development Acts 2000-2014 sets out the procedure for initiation of a variation stating "a planning authority may at any time, for stated reasons, decide to make a variation of a development plan which for the time being is in force."

Councillors were advised that the Council must set out clear planning reasons and justification for proposing the variation and that the resolution, if passed, was an initial step in a statutory process which may or may not result in the variation of the Meath County Development Plan in due course. Councillors were advised that their motion would not have immediate effect nor could it inform the Council in the discharge of its statutory obligations unless and until a variation was formally made by the Council.

The Chief Executive prepared a report on the Emlagh Wind Farm proposal to which the Councillors subsequently appended their views at the December Council meeting. Councillors are reminded that An Bord Pleanála is the competent Authority for SID applications and that the Bord, in its consideration of such applications, is not bound by the provisions of a County Development Plan or subsequent variation.

Furthermore, the attention of the Councillors was drawn to Circular Letter PL 20-13 (attached) issued on 20th December 2013 in the context of its ongoing review of the Wind Energy Guidelines and the Renewable Energy Export Policy and Development Framework.

The letter, from the Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government, stated "As the preparation or variation of Local Authority Development plans must take account of all relevant and up to date National policy, it is therefore advised that until both of the above national policy review processes have concluded, Local Authorities should defer amending the existing Development Plan policies as





part of either the cyclical review or variation processes. They should instead operate their existing Development plan policies and objectives until the completion of these processes and advised otherwise by the department". Councillors were also advised that all draft variations must be referred to the Minister for comment and that Planning Authorities must have regard to any submission by the Minister in considering a variation.

The Minister of Environment, Community and Local Government has statutory powers under Section 31 of the Planning and Development Acts 2000-2014 to direct a local authority to amend its development plan where the policies contained therein do not take sufficient account of the submissions made by the Minister or of national or regional policy. The Councillors' attention was drawn to the Ministerial direction to Westmeath County Council where they proposed to vary their Development Plan policies on Wind Energy in November 2013. Westmeath County Council was subsequently directed to amend their variation on Wind Energy in order to comply with Government policy.

The Chief Executive, in her response to the Kells MD members' motion advised the Council against varying the County Development Plan and, cautioned that the Council may be directed not to proceed. An amended motion, as set out above, was unanimously adopted against the advice of the Chief Executive.

The Council deemed it appropriate in the first instance, to put the Department on notice of the wishes of the Elected Members and wrote to the Department of the Environment Community and Local Government on 20th November 2014.

The Council requested the Department to provide it with an update on the focused review of the Wind Energy Development Guidelines and sought advices in light of the Department Circular Letter of the 20th December, 2013. The Council has not received a response to its request to date.

Councillors are advised that the Chief Executive may not act in contravention of guidance from the Minister.

The Council will contact the Department again seeking a formal response to its letter of 20th November before initiating the variation process.

8.3 Submitted by Councillor Claire O' Driscoll

"3436 persons were deemed to potentially have an outstanding NPPR liability within Meath in 2014. 1014 persons discharged this liability fully and 89 payment plans were entered into following letters issued to the people in question in July of last year. How





much if any has been budgeted for within the 2015 budget and what processes if any are in place to address the circumstance where people have not responded in any way to a letter sent last year?"

Response:

€100,000 income has been budgeted for in 2015.

At present, resources available are allocated to dealing with persons that have contacted Meath County Council with regard to liability, payment plans etc. Also a large amount of time is spent complying with our statutory obligation under Local Government (Household Charge) Act 2011 Section 19(2)(J)(8) of providing Certificates of Discharge/Exemption within 14 days. These are requested for most transfers of residential property. Approximately 1,926 certificates have been issued in the last 12 months.

Under Section 5 under the Local Government (Charges) Act 2009, it is the responsibility of the owner to declare their liability. Before changes to the NPPR charge came into effect under the Local Government Reform Act 2014, which increased the penalties for non payment, Meath County Council attempted to contact persons who may be liable. This was to inform them to check their liability (if any) in relation to the charge. Information from the Revenue Commissioners was used in this task.

If persons are liable and have not paid, the charge increased form 4,220 to 7,230 and remains as a charge on the property for 12 years. As can be seen from the above, issuing of certificates or discharge/exemption is the key to getting paid outstanding NPPR monies as the sale/transfer of residential property will not proceed unless provided. Allocating resources to this, instead of contacting persons to check their liability, is more productive especially when the rate of transfer of ownership of residential property is increasing.

At present, 1142 properties have paid the NPPR since letters issued in July 2014. At present there are 157 agreements. Meath County Council is also in contact with approximately 130 persons in order to regularise their NPPR liability.

9.1 Submitted by Councillor Noel French (deferred from April meeting)





"That Meath County Council compile and issue a weekly e-newsletter to community organisations that are part of the PPN and to any other interested bodies and individuals."

<u>Supporting Information subject to the motion being proposed, seconded and considered.</u>

The PPN structure has been fully established and a key issue will be putting a communication process in place using the established structures to full advantage. This matter will be discussed in detail with the PPN secretariat.

9.2 Submitted by Councillor Darren O' Rourke

That Meath County Council would begin the process of engagement with the community and stakeholders with a view to changing the name of the main street in Ashbourne from Frederick Street to Thomas Ashe Street (Sráid Thomás Ághas, as Gaeilge) in time for 2016 to commemorate Commander Ashe's role in the Battle of Ashbourne 1916 and more broadly in the cause of Irish Freedom./Go dtosóidh Comhairle Contae na Mí an próiseas maidir le plé a dhéanamh leis an bpobal agus le páirtithe leasmhara maidir le ainm Príomhshráid Chill Dhéagláin a athrú ó Shráid Frederick go Sráid Thomás Ághas faoi 2016 chun chomóradh a dhéanamh ar ról Ceannasaí Ághas i gCath Chill Dhéagláin agus níos leithne arís ar son saoirse na hÉireann.

Councillor Darren O'Rourke advised the meeting of his intention to withdraw the motion.

9.3 Submitted by Councillor Wayne Harding (see item 5.6.2)

Given all of the information presented to us in relation to traffic management options since An Bord Pleanála refused permission for the N2 Slane Bypass in March 2012, I call upon this Council to:

1. Conclude that there is no appropriate traffic management alternative to an N2 Bypass for Slane as the traffic management options that have been presented to us and put on public display clearly show that all such options are impractical and/or ineffective in trying to improve road safety and traffic congestion in Slane village and across the wider road network.





- 2. Recommence work on a scheme which will provide for an N2 Bypass of Slane village with a view to reapplying for statutory approval as soon as possible
- 3. Immediately seek the necessary funding and support from the NRA for such a scheme.

9.4 Submitted by Councillor Wayne Forde (deferred from April meeting)

"To call on all Councillors to fully support the retention of acute 24/7 psychiatric care at Our Lady's Hospital in Navan. It is our County Meath hospital, and we must send a clear message to the Government and the HSE, that we are fully united, in our support, for the acute psychiatric service for people and patients living in Navan and in Co. Meath, for patient care and safety. I ask that this motion is sent to the Minister for Health, Leo Varadkar, and all Meath Oireachtas Members."

The motion, proposed by **Councillor Wayne Forde** and seconded by **Councillor Sharon Keogan**, was unanimously adopted.

9.5 Submitted by Councillor Wayne Forde (deferred from April meeting)

"I call on all Councillors of Meath County Council to support my motion of no confidence in Irish Water, and to call on Minister Alan Kelly T.D. and the Fine Gael/Labour Party Government to abolish Irish water."

The motion, proposed by **Councillor Wayne Forde** and seconded by **Councillor Darren O'Rourke**.

Following a lengthy debate, an amendment to the motion was proposed by **Councillor Brian Fitzgerald** and seconded by **Councillor Francis Deane**.

"I call on all Councillors of Meath County Council to support my motion of no confidence in Irish Water in its current form."

9.6 Submitted by Councillor Wayne Harding (deferred from April meeting)

"This Council calls on Minister Alex White T.D. and the Department of Communications Energy and Natural Resources to scrap the controversial and confusing Eircode design, and asks that a free and open tender, that does not exclude small business, be held for the design of a modern, smart, structured postcode with integrated geolocation (GPS) data."

9.8 Submitted by Councillor Maria Murphy (deferred from April meeting)

"This Council welcomes the publication of the 'Guidelines for Setting & Managing Speed Limits' which was recently launched by Minister for Transport, Sport & Tourism Paschal Donohoe TD. However we call on the Minister to review the default speed limit of 50km per hour which currently applies in housing estates, and ask that he set a default of 30km per hour for all housing estates."

9.9 Submitted by Councillor Michael Gallagher

That Meath County Council notes EirGrid's new draft strategy for the development of Ireland's transmission grid and the scope therein for the under grounding of cables in Grid West and Grid Link projects; calls for the Government to initiate an immediate and complete review of the North South Interconnector Project in light of the most up to date information in relation to undergrounding. /Go dtugann Comhairle Chontae na Mí suntas go bhfuil an dréachtstraitéis nua maidir le forbairt gréasán tarchuir Éireann agus an scóip atá ann maidir le folú cáblaí i dtionscadail Grid West agus Grid Link agus éilíonn sí ar an Rialtas athbhreithniú láithreach agus cuimsitheach a dhéanamh ar an tionscadal Idirnascaire Thuaidh-Theas agus an t-eolas is deireanaí maidir le folú faoi thalamh againn.
