







'Popcorn: Science Corner: Weather and Seasons' Alice Harman Wayland




'What's in the Witch's Kitchen?' Nick Sharratt Walker









'What's the Time, Clockodile?' Jonathan Litton and Fhiona Galloway Little Tiger


Children will love finding out about all kinds of amazing animals from around the world, including gorillas, pandas, penguins and koalas.

Spot the sleeping animals as the tale unfolds, then learn about their hibernation habits from the information pages at the end.




'WOW! Said the Owl' Tim Hopgood Macmillan
