#### Background to the Section 5 Application

12th Field and the Irish Architecture Foundation have been working with the local community in Girley to facilitate the hosting of the Bog Bothy in Girley Bog for a short period from mid-August to mid-September 2025. The bog bothy is a temporary timber pavilion that will be erected on land owned by the NPWS (see attached site location map) as part of the Bog Bothy Tour being hosted in Offaly and Meath over Summer 2025, an event which is funded by Creative Ireland's Climate Action Fund, Meath

County Council and the NPWS. The NPWS have given permission for the use of the land for this purpose, and have been fully engaged with the process, including site selection. A letter of permission is included with this application. Furthermore, the NPWS have carried out screening for Appropriate Assessment, given that the site is located on the edge of the Girley Bog NHA, and have screened the site out. A report with details is also included with this application.

The bothy will consist of a temporary timber pavilion (21sqm in area and 4.5m high), that will be erected on the site from 15<sup>th</sup> August until mid-September. The structure is self-contained and has no foundations, so the ground where it installed will not be disturbed. The structure will be used for workshops and guided events run by the Irish Architecture Foundation, the NPWS and the local community as part of National Heritage Week.

It is not intended that there will be parking available on site. Visitors to the bothy will be asked to walk from the two established parking areas, and an area designated for parking closer to the bothy will be provided only for those people who cannot walk the longer distance to the bothy. This area – an agricultural field with no livestock - has also been selected in consultation with the NPWS.

The bog bothy is a structure designed to raise awareness of the bog, the living culture and architectural heritage of the bog, and to allow people to spend time with the bog without damaging the bog. As part of the project we have had extensive conversations with NPWS staff both at local and national level. The team have selected this site with local ranger Ciara Rock and regional manager Padraig O'Donnell as it is located on the edge of the NHA. It has been screened out for Appropriate Assessment, meaning it would not pose any risk to the NHA through the activities in the bothy. The site itself was until recently a Christmas tree plantation and is in the very early stages of bog restoration. It will be accessed from the public road across level firm ground. The field gate and bothy are lockable and can be fully secured between activities. It is not intended that anyone would overnight in the bothy while it is installed in Girley.

We have also had extensive conversations with Emma Prunty and Meadhbh Rogan, Meath Co Co Creative team, and with Ben Malone Biodiversity Officer, in relation to the activities at the bothy. All are fully supportive of the bothy visit to Girley Bog.

#### **Reason for Exemption**

As the structure is a temporary structure intended to be used not continuously for a period of approximately 4 weeks we propose it is exempted development under Class 37 (development for amenity or recreational purposes) of the Planning and Development Regulation, 2001. As there are no dug foundations for the bothy, the land will be reinstated as before after use. The structure and associated activities have been screened out for Appropriate Assessment.

#### Planning and Development Regulations, 2001

Part 1; Exempted Development - General

Development for amenity or recreational purposes

#### CLASS 37

Development consisting of the use of land for any fair, funfair, bazaar or circus or any local event of a religious, cultural, educational, political, social, recreational or sporting character and the placing or maintenance of tents, vans or other temporary or movable structures or objects on the land in connection with such use.

- 1. The land shall not be used for any such purposes either continuously for a period exceeding 15 days or occasionally for periods exceeding in aggregate 30 days in any year.
- 2. On the discontinuance of such use the land shall be reinstated save to such extent as may be authorised or required by a permission under the Act.


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# Screening for Appropriate Assessment

Determination of proposed Bog Bothy Festival within Girley Bog, Natural Heritage Area in accordance with Regulation 42A EC (Birds and Natural) Habitats Regulations 2011-2021



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## 1. Introduction

This determination on Screening for Appropriate Assessment (AA) has been made by the Ecological Assessment Unit (EAU) of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage (DHLGH) in accordance with Regulation 42A(8) of the European Communities (Birds and Natural Habitats) Regulations 2011-2021 ('the 2011 Regulations').

On the 14<sup>th</sup> February 2025, in accordance with the requirements of Regulation 42A(3) of the 2011-2021 Regulations, the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage ('the Minister') furnished the EAU with a request for a Screening for Appropriate Assessment (AA) determination for a proposed Bog Bothy Festival at Girley Bog Natural Heritage Area [001580]. Hereafter referred to as "the project".

The EAU have evaluated and analysed the information contained in the referred to above document and location maps provided and carried out a determination. The purpose of this document is to provide a record and an audit trail of the EAU reasoned thinking in view of best scientific knowledge and the Conservation Objectives of the European Sites.

# 2. Background

Pursuant to Regulation 42A(1) of the European Communities (Birds and Natural Habitats) Regulations, 2011 (S.I. 477 of 2011), a Screening for AA is required to be carried out on the project. AA is a process required under Article 6(3) of the EU Habitats Directive. Article 6(3) is transposed in Ireland by the European Communities (Birds and Natural Habitats) Regulations 2011 (S.I. No. 477 of 2011), as amended, and by Part XAB of the Planning and Development Act, 2000, as amended.

All plans and projects which are not directly connected with or necessary to the management of a European Site, but which either individually or in combination with other plans or projects, are likely to have a significant effect on a "European Site", require that an AA of these effects to determine if they will adversely affect the integrity of these sites. The proposed Bog Bothy Festival is considered to fall under the requirements of AA as applied to all plans and projects.

The Screening for AA process scrutinises the plan or project to determine if there is potential for likely significant effects either individually or in combination with other plans or projects, on a European Site. European Sites are part of the Natura 2000 network and include those designated as Special Areas of Conservation (SAC), Candidate SACs (cSACs) or Special Protection Areas (SPA). This Screening for Appropriate Assessment describes the outcome of this analysis in respect of the project.

## 3.2. Assessment Methodology

This report is based on review of desktop data. Sources of information utilised for this report and accessed during March 2025 include the following:

- National Parks & Wildlife Service (NPWS) Designations Viewer<sup>2</sup>; and,
- National Biodiversity Data Centre (NBDC) Maps<sup>3</sup>.

### 3.3. Legislative Background

According to the EU Habitats Directive (92/43/EEC) and the EU Birds Directive (79/409/EEC), Member States are required to establish a Natura 2000 network of sites of highest biodiversity importance for rare and threatened habitats and species across the EU.

In Ireland, the Natura 2000 network of European sites comprises SACs, candidate SACs and SPAs.

SACs are selected for the conservation of Annex I habitats (including priority types which are in danger of disappearance) and Annex II species (other than birds). SPAs are selected for the conservation of Annex I birds and all migratory birds and their habitats. The Annex habitats and species, for which each site is selected, are the qualifying interests (QI) for SACs and special conservation interests (SCI) for SPAs of each site. Conservation objectives for the site are defined for these qualifying interests.

A key requirement of the Habitats Directive is that the effects of any plan or project, which is not directly connected with or necessary to the management of a European Site, but which alone, or in combination with, other plans or projects, are likely to have a significant effect on a European Site, should be assessed before any decision is made to allow that plan or project to proceed. The obligation to undertake a screening for AA, and if necessary, an AA, derives from Article 6(3) of the Habitats Directive and both involve a number of steps and tests that need to be applied in sequential order.

Article 6(3) is concerned with the strict protection of sites, while Article 6(4) is the procedure for allowing derogation from this strict protection in certain restricted circumstances.

#### Article 6(3) of the Habitats Directive states:

"Any plan or project not directly connected with, or necessary to, the management of the site but likely to have a significant effect thereon, either individually or in combination with other plans and projects, shall be subject to appropriate assessment of its implications for the site in view of the site's conservation objectives. In the light of the conclusions of the assessment of the implications for the site and subject to the provisions of paragraph 4, the competent national authorities shall agree to the plan or project only having ascertained that it will not adversely affect the integrity of the site concerned and if appropriate, after having obtained the opinion of the general public".

#### Article 6(4) states:

"If, in spite of a negative assessment of the implications for the site and in the absence of alternative solutions, a plan or project must nevertheless be carried out for imperative reasons of overriding public interest, including those of social or economic nature, the Member State shall take all compensatory measures necessary to ensure that the overall coherence of Natura 2000 is protected. It shall inform the Commission of the compensatory measures adopted.

Where the site concerned hosts a priority natural habitat type and/or a priority species, the only considerations which may be raised are those relating to human health or public safety, to beneficial consequences of primary importance for the environment or, further to an opinion from the Commission, to other imperative reasons of overriding public interest."

The competent authority is required to carry out a screening for AA, and if necessary, an AA as required by Article 6(3) of the Habitats Directive. If the competent authority determines that the plan or project will adversely affect the integrity of a European site, it may only authorise that plan or project by following the Article 6(4) procedure.

The Article 6(3) and 6(4) procedures are outlined as follows:

**Stage 1 - Screening for Appropriate Assessment** – to assess, in view of best scientific knowledge, if the project or plan, individually or in combination with another plan or project is likely to have a significant effect on the Natura 2000 site.

**Stage 2 - Appropriate Assessment** – This is required if it cannot be excluded, on the basis of objective information, that the project or plan, individually or in combination with other plans or projects, will have a significant effect on a Natura 2000 site. The AA must include a final determination by the competent authority as to whether or not a proposed project would adversely affect the integrity of a Natura 2000 site. In order to reach a final determination, the competent authority must undertake examination, analysis and evaluation, followed by findings, conclusions and a final determination. The appropriate assessment must contain complete, precise and definitive findings and conclusions, and may not have lacunae or gaps.

**Stage 3 – Assessment of alternative solutions** - the process which examines alternative ways of achieving the objectives of the project or plan that avoid adverse impacts on the integrity of the Natura 2000 site.

Stage 4 - Assessment where no alternative solutions exist and where adverse impacts remain - an assessment of compensatory measures where, in the light of an assessment of imperative reasons of overriding public interest (IROPI), it is deemed that the project or plan should proceed.

Under Regulation 42A(1) of the European Communities (Birds and Natural Habitats) Regulations, 2011 (S.I. 477 of 2011), the Ecological Assessment Unit is the competent authority in relation to screening for AA of projects and plans (such as the proposed project) which the Minister proposes to undertake or adopt.

# 4. Overview of the Project

The proposed project is for Bothy Bog Festival at Girley Bog NHA [001580] (Figure 1).

Girley Bog NHA comprises a raised bog that includes both areas of high bog and cutover bog, and is bounded in parts by coniferous forestry to the south and north. This site supports a good diversity of raised bog microhabitats, including hummocks and pools. This site is one of the few remaining raised bogs in County Meath and represents the eastern extreme of the range of raised bogs in the country.

The proposed Bog Bothy Festival is a two location celebration of peatland heritage, conservation and community climate action. The second location – Clara Bog SAC - has been assessed separately.

## 4.1. Purpose

The proposed Bog Bothy Festival by Irish Architecture Foundation (IAF) has sought funding via the Peatlands and Natura Community Engagement Scheme. The Scheme aims to encourage communities, local organisations and other interested parties to become involved in the enhancement of their natural surrounding areas and to raise awareness.

Applications are welcomed across a diverse range of initiatives with community benefit from events, education programmes, promotions, publications, exhibitions, development of conservation management plans, public amenity and recreational measures, maintenance measures that support conservation measures, monitoring or surveying work to inform of restoration/conservation projects, invasive species and fire control measures, anti-littering initiatives to local environmental improvements in the area of the designated sites and other peatland areas.

Bog Bothy Festival is intended to educate and raise public awareness of the living landscape of the bog and its habitats and species. It is proposed to celebrate, community, climate action and cultural connection to these sites. The festival aims to support audiences and communities to understand the inextricable link to natural heritage.

# 4.2. Project Description

The project proposes to create a Bothy – a space for shelter, retreat and engagement with Irelands evolving peat landscapes. The festival is proposed for two periods of 28 days in both Offaly (June) and Meath (August) and would incorporate exhibitions, ecological walks, workshops and climate conversations while convening in the bog habitat. The festival will utilise a temporary Bothy installation with a platform for the community, education and ecological activities as part of the programme. The Bothy will be in place for less than 28 days at each location. This application does not include funding for the Bothy structure (which has been funded through Community climate action funding from Creative Ireland), however the proposed festival and activities in

this application make use of the proposed Bothy structure and so it is considered in the impact of this proposal.




Figure 2. (below): Proposed location of the Bog Bothy Festival within Girley Bog NHA as per the proponent's method statement submitted to NPWS in support of the PNCES application.

The proposed bothy site at Girley Bog (Figure 2) is part of the cutover bog, bounded to the North by a road/track with a ditch. The site has recently been cleared of a planted conifer plantation. The site is in a degraded condition and has recently undergone tree clearance under the direction of the NPWS. It is significant in being a good example of the early stages of peatland restoration in action, and is suitable as a site to educate visitors and the wider public about this process. A temporary walking exhibition is proposed to utilise the boardwalk at the end of the track road adjacent the bothy site. This will comprise a number of project information panels affixed to the boardwalk in agreed locations and will be in place for the duration of the festival.

The works at both sites comprise the installation of a temporary "Bog Bothy" structure – an enclosed space for group gatherings, workshops and a base for research. The bothy itself will be constructed off-site. The structure is approximately 20sqm in floor area and sits on a temporary platform placed on the surface of the bog. The bothy will remain in place on each site for less than 28 days and will be removed at the end of this period.

A defined site work area will be set out and clearly demarcated. The ground will be prepared prior to the arrival of the bothy on site. The site will be walked with the ecology team to carry out a final check for the presence of protected species. The footings for the structure will comprise timber ground beams on tyres. Boards laid across this base will form a platform approx. 7m by 7m in area. The bothy will be transported to the site in segments. There will be some on-site construction work comprising the erection of the frame onto the platform and bolting together of panel elements.

A post-use site survey is proposed to be carried out by the ecology team to ascertain the impact of the festival. Damage to the ground is expected to be minimal however any local areas where foot traffic has flattened the earth will be repaired in consultation with the ecology team and to NPWS guidelines.

Figure 1. (below): Location of Girley Bog NHA [001580] (blue highlighted area) as per NPWS designations map viewer,

# 1. Site Location & Description

The application site is located in the townland of Girley, in Girley Bog, approximately 500m west of the rural node of Fordstown. The proposed project is for Bothy Bog Festival at Girley Bog NHA (001580). Girley Bog comprises a raised bog that includes both areas of high bog and cutover bog and is bounded in parts by coniferous forestry to the south and north. This site is one of the few remaining raised bogs in Co. Meath and represents the eastern extreme of the range of raised bogs in the country. The proposed Bog Bothy Festival is a two-location celebration of peatland heritage, conservation and community climate action. The second location – Clara Bog SAC has been assessed separately by Offaly County Council.

There are no National Monuments within or adjoining the application site. The site is located in a RA – Rural Area. The site is not located within an Architectural Conservation Area (ACA). The site is designated an Area Under Strong Urban Influence, according to the Meath County Development Plan 2021-2027. There are no Protected Structures, National Monuments or Protected Views within the application site. The site is located in the Lowland Landscape (namely the Southwest Kells Lowlands) which has a moderate value and moderate sensitivity.




Figure 1: Extract from Google Imagery showing subject site.

# 2. Proposed Declaration:

The applicant describes the development in the completed application form as 'the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour". The Planning Authority is considering this question as:

Whether the extension of an existing dwelling is or is not development and is or is not exempted development.

The completed application form and submitted documents indicate that the extent of works proposed shall comprise of a temporary timber pavilion (21sqm in area and 4.5m in ridge height).

# 3. Planning History:

A review of Meath County Council's historical planning data and mapping systems indicates no planning history with the subject site.

# 4. Internal, External and Prescribed Body Referrals:

No referred.

#### 5. Relevant National Legislation

In order to assess whether or not the works described in Section 2 of this report is or is not development or is or is not exempted development regard must be had to the following national legislation set out below.

#### 5.1 Section 2 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023

Section 2 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023 provides the following interpretations which are relevant:

"development" has the meaning assigned to it by section 3, and "develop" shall be construed accordingly.

"Exempted development" has the meaning specified in section 4.

"structure" means *inter alia* any building, structure, excavation, or other thing constructed or made on, in or under any land, or any part of a structure so defined, and where the context so admits, includes the land on, in or under which the structure is situate; and

"works" includes any act or operation of construction, excavation, demolition, extension, alteration, repair or renewal and, in relation to a protected structure or proposed protected structure, includes any act or operation involving the application or removal of plaster, paint, wallpaper, tiles or other material to or from the surfaces of the interior or exterior of a structure.

#### 5.2 Section 3 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023

Section 3(1) of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023 defines "development" as follows:

"Development means except where the context otherwise requires, the carrying out of any works on, in over or under land or the making of any material change in the use of any structures or other land."

#### 5.3 Section 4 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023

Section 4(1) of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023 provides a list of statutory exempted development including:

"(j) development consisting of the use of any structure or other land within the curtilage of a house for any purpose incidental to the enjoyment of the house as such;'

Section 4(2) of the Planning and Development Acts 2000-2023 provides for the making of regulations relating to exempted development. The Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025 give effect to section 4(2).

Section 4 (2) (a) (i)

'The Minister may by regulations provide for any class of development to be exempted development for the purposes of this Act where he or she is of the opinion that—

(i) by reason of the size, nature or limited effect on its surroundings, of development belonging to that class, the carrying out of such development would not offend against principles of proper planning and sustainable development, or.'

#### Section 4 (4)

'Notwithstanding paragraphs (a), (i), (ia) and (l) of subsection (1) and any regulations under subsection (2), development shall not be exempted development if an environmental impact assessment or an appropriate assessment of the development is required.'

# 5.4 Section 5 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023

Section 5 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023 provides inter alia:

- (1) If any question arises as to what, in any particular case, is or is not development or is or is not exempted development within the meaning of this Act, any person may, on payment of the prescribed fee, request in writing from the relevant planning authority a declaration on that question, and that person shall provide to the planning authority any information necessary to enable the authority to make its decision on the matter.
- (2) (a) Subject to paragraph (b), a planning authority shall issue the declaration on the question that has arisen and the main reasons and considerations on which its decision is based to the person who made the request under subsection (1), and, where appropriate, the owner and occupier of the land in question, within 4 weeks of the receipt of the request.
  - (b) A planning authority may require any person who made a request under *subsection* (1) to submit further information with regard to the request in order to enable the authority to issue the declaration on the question and, where further information is received under this paragraph, the planning authority shall issue the declaration within 3 weeks of the date of the receipt of further information.
  - (c) A planning authority may also request persons in addition to those referred to in paragraph (b) to submit information in order to enable the authority to issue the declaration on the question.

# 5.5 Section 32 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023

Section 32 of the Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023 sets out a general obligation to obtain planning permission in respect of any development of land, not being exempted development, and in the case of development, which is unauthorised, for the retention of that unauthorised development.

# 5.6 Article 6 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025

Article 6 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025 provides (subject to the restrictions in article 9 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025) for the classes of exempted development under column 1 of Parts 1, 2 and 3 of Schedule 2, subject, where applicable, to the conditions and limitations imposed upon such classes as set out in column 2.

# 5.7 Class 37 of Article 6, Part 1 of Schedule 2 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025

Class 37 Development consisting of the use of land for any fair, funfair, bazaar or circus or any local event of a religious, cultural, educational, political, social, recreational or sporting character and the placing or maintenance of tents, vans, or other temporary or movable structures or objects on the land in connection with such use.

#### Conditions and Limitations attached thereto:

- 1. The land shall not be used for any such purpose either continuously for a period exceeding 15 days or occasionally for periods exceeding in aggregate 30 days in any year.
- 2. On the discontinuance of such use the land shall be reinstated save to such extent as may be authorized or required by a permission under the Act.



# Article 9 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025

Article 9 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025 imposes specific restrictions on development of classes specified in Parts 1, 2 and 3 of Schedule 2 and in effect de-exempts certain classes of development that would be exempt under normal circumstances.

#### 6. Assessment:

In essence, the question has arisen as to whether 'the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour", is or is not development and is or is not exempted development. In this regard, it is necessary to consider the question of "development" and "exempted development" as provided for in statute and summarised above.

# 6.1 "Development"

It is considered that the subject proposal, as outlined above, falls within the statutory interpretation of "works" within the section 3(1) Planning & Development Acts 2000-2023 definition of development. Whether the works are development and exempted development or development and not exempted development requires an assessment of each of the component elements against the provisions of Class 1 of Part 1 of Schedule 2 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025 respectively.

# 6.2 "Exempted Development"

In terms of whether the development is exempted development, the Applicant proposes to erect a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour". This will be a temporary timber pavilion with a floor area of 21sqm and a ridge height of 4.5m. This will be erected on site from 15<sup>th</sup> August 2025 until mid-September 2025.

The structure is self-contained and has no foundations, so the ground where it is will not be disturbed. The structure will be used for workshops and guided events run by the Irish Architecture Foundation, the NPWS and the local community as part of National Heritage Week. It is stated with the application the project proposes to create a Bothy – a space for shelter, retreat and engagement with Ireland's evolving peat landscapes. The festival is proposed for 28 days and is within the Conditions and Limitations for time schedule.

To benefit from an exemption under Class 37 of Article 6, Part 1 of Schedule 2 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2001-2025, which provides for 'the extension to rear of existing cottage' must accord with the listed conditions/limitations. In this regard, the proposed erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour" falls within the listed conditions/limitations. Furthermore, from a review of the submitted drawings the Planning Officer considers that the proposed development would comply with all relevant conditions and limitations set out under Class 37, Part 1, Schedule 2 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025.

On the basis of the details submitted with the application, the Planning Officer considers that the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour" proposed meets the Conditions and Limitations set out under Column 2 of Class 37 of Part 1 of Schedule 2 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025 and is therefore exempted development.

Based on the foregoing, I believe that the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour". At Girley Bog, Fordstown is development and is exempted development pursuant Class 37 of Article 6, Part 1 of Schedule 2 Planning and Development Regulations 2001-2025.

## 7. Appropriate Assessment:

Article 6(3) of Council Directive 92/43/EEC (as amended) on the conservation of natural habitats and of wild fauna and flora ('the Habitats Directive') requires that any plan or project that is not directly connected with or necessary to the management of the Natura 2000 site concerned but is likely to have a significant effect on it, on its own or in combination with other plans and projects, is to be authorised only if it will not adversely affect the integrity of that site. The application site is not within any designated Natura 2000 site. The nearest sites located within 15km of the subject site are as follows:

- Girley (Drewstown) Bog SAC (002203) ~ 400m to the northwest
- Girley Bog NHA (001580) ~ adjacent to the site.

The NPWS have given permission for the use of the land for this purpose, and have been fully engaged with the process, including site selection. A letter of permission is included with the application. Furthermore, the NPWS have carried out screening for Appropriate Assessment, given that the bog is located on the edge of the Girley Bog NHA and have screened the site out. The proposed bothy site at Girley Bog (see in Figure 2 of AA Screening Report), is part

of the cutover bog, bounded to the north by a road/track with a ditch. The site has recently been cleared of a planted conifer plantation. The site is in a degraded condition and has recently undergone tree clearance under the direction of the NPWS. A temporary walking exhibition is proposed to utilise the boardwalk at the end of the track road adjacent the bothy site. The Bog Bothy will be located on a temporary structure above the ground and will be at this location permanently.

The Planning Authority considered the nature, scale and location of the proposed development and other plans and projects (where there could be potential for cumulative or in-combination effects), the conservation objectives/ qualifying interests of European Sites within the vicinity of the site and the distance to European Sites, any protected habitats or species, the WFD catchment location, the underlying aquifer type and vulnerability and the excavation works, emissions, transportation requirements and duration of construction and operation and cumulative impacts associated with the proposal.

The Planning Authority's Screening for Appropriate Assessment has considered the potential effects including direct, indirect and in-combination effects of the proposed development, individually or in combination with the permitted developments and cumulatively with other plans or projects on European Sites. The Planning Authority concludes that the proposed development (entire project), by itself or in combination with other plans and developments in the vicinity, would not be likely to have a significant effect on European Site(s). In light of this, it is considered that a Stage 2 Appropriate Assessment (Natura Impact Statement) is not required in this instance.

# 8. Environmental Impact Assessment:

The proposed development is not a development type listed under Part 1 or 2 of Schedule 5 of the Planning & Development Regulations (PDR) 2001 - 2025 nor is it considered a subthreshold development for the purposes of Schedule 7 PDR. Based on information provided and having considered the nature, size and location of the development, there is no real likelihood of significant effects on the environment and as such as EIS/EIAR is not required.

#### 9. Conclusion and Recommendation:

Having regard to the development proposed, I conclude that the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour" at Girley Bog, Fordstown County Meath proposed by Emmet Scanlon, Director; Irish Architecture Foundation is development and is exempted development.

I recommend that the application for an exempted development certificate is **GRANTED** for the following reason:

WHEREAS the question has arisen as to whether the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour". 'at Girley Bog, Fordstown, Co. Meath is or is not development and is or is not exempted development.

**AND WHEREAS** the said question was referred to Meath County Council by the Applicant, Emmett Scanlon, Irish Architecture Foundation

**AND WHEREAS** Meath County Council, in considering this reference, had particular regard to:

- (a) Sections 2, 3, 4, 5 and 32 of the Planning & Development Act 2000-2023 and articles 6 and 9 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025.
- (b) The definition of "development" in section 3 of the Planning & Development Act 2000-2023 and
- (c) The provisions under Class 37 of Article 6, Part 1 of Schedule 2 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025

#### AND WHEREAS Meath County Council has concluded that:

- (a) The erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour" at Girley Bog, Fordstown, County Meath comprises works and is development under section 3(1) of the Planning & Development Act 2000-2023 and
- (b) the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour" at Girley Bog, Fordstown County Meath is exempted development under the provisions of Class 37 of Article 6, Part 1 of Schedule 2 of the Planning & Development Regulations 2001-2025.
- (c) Information submitted.

NOW THEREFORE Meath County Council in exercise of the powers conferred on it by Section 5(2)(a) of the Planning and Development Act 2000-2023 hereby decides that 'the erection of a temporary wooden pavilion (Bog Bothy) to be used for occasional workshops and events from mid-August to mid-September as part of the Irish Architecture Foundation's "Bog Bothy Tour", at Girley Bog, Foreston Meath is development and is **EXEMPTED DEVELOPMENT**.
